ABOUT THE ARTISTS



JEAN PIERCE - PLAYWRIGHT

Birmingham native, Jean Pierce, affectionately known as "Ms. Jean," was the resident playwright at Birmingham Children's Theatre and has been with the theatre for over 40 years. She became associated with the theatre first as a board member, then an actress, director and writer. She has written plays mostly for the WeeFolks Theatre, but also for Birmingham Theatre's MainStage productions. She has adapted many of the fairytales and folktales most of us are familiar with and loves writing for children. Ms. Jean got the acting "bug" while at Birmingham Southern, where she received her B.A. in theatre. She did some graduate work in theatre at the University of Utah, but soon came back to Birmingham and worked with local theatres as an actress. She has said, "The only thing I had any gift for or always wanted to do was to entertain. When I write I have a feel for the dialogue and once the characters are there I kind of know

what they are going to say." She received the Governor Arts Award at the Alabama Shakespeare Festival in Montgomery, AL for her work. On a personal note, Ms. Jean is married and has two sons, Stephen and Adam. She has enjoyed living in the Mountain Brook area in the same house for over 50 years.



JAY TUMMINELLO - MUSICIAN & LYRICIST

Jay Tumminello began playing the piano at age 5. At age 14, he started playing Holmes Street United Methodist Church in Huntsville, Alabama. Tumminello studied at the University of Alabama, majoring in piano performance, with a composite minor in organ and composition. After college, he took the organist position at Epworth United Methodist Church in Huntsville, where he remained for 10 years. In 2005 he relocated to New York City. While living in New York, he served the American Archdiocese of the Greek Orthodox Church, the American mother church of that denomination. Tumminello returned to Birmingham in 2013 and has been a huge part of Birmingham Childrens Theatres' shows and programs, often teaming up with Jean Pierce, BCT's resident playwright for over 40 years, as well as been a vital part of the Birmingham theatre community.

STATE STANDARDS

ACTIVITIES

TISSUE BOX-GUITAR CRAFT

· Step 1: Tools & Supplies

Empty tissue box (the long kind)

Empty Paper Towel Roll

3 Rubber bands (You may want another in case one snaps)

Tape

Something to cut with

Marker

- **Step 2: Cut off cellophane:** Cut around the edge of the opening to get out the plastic that the tissues come through.
- Step 3: Cut hole for the neck: Go to one of the small sides of the box, and put your paper towel roll

on top. Use your marker to trace around the roll, and then

cut out the circle.





• **Step 4: Insert the neck:** Insert the neck into the hole about 2 inches. If there is much space around the neck, and it doesn't stay well, stick tape around it to help stop it from sliding.





Step 5: Attach strings: Put a rubber band around the box, one on each side of the neck. You can also





put one straight in the middle by cutting halfway through the neck right at the base, sliding a rubber band into the slit, and taping over the where you cut.

- Step 6: Extras
 - 1. Add bridges

Bridges raise the strings of a guitar off the base, allowing the strings to vibrate freely in the air, producing better notes.

What you need: 2 index cards & tape

- a. Fold up the index cards so that they are a little less than a cm wide.
- b. Place under strings at the very top, and bottom, of the base of the guitar.

Then tape to the box on the sides, where the tape won't interfere with the strings.

2. Make different tones using different types of rubber bands

Using different size and thickness of rubber bands will change the notes they produce when plucked.

What you need:

Different rubber bands!

3. Add space for strumming

What you need: Your cutting device from before

- 1. Figure out which way you hold the guitar, and then determine which side faces down as you play.
- 2. Cut out as much space as you need from the bottom of the hole. (when you're holding it, NOT the thin side) I needed about a centimeter.
- **Step 6: Decorate:** Use whatever you want to make your guitar unique! (Stickers, crayons, paint, etc.)

You're done! Now you can be just like Goldie.

ACTIVITIES

BEAR CONE FINGER PUPPET CRAFT

Make your own three little bear finger puppets.

What you need: White computer paper

Scissors Glue

Cotton balls or fiberfill stuffing

Optional: Crayons, colored pencils or markers

Step 1: Print template sheet. (See Printables Packet page 2)

Step 2: Cut out the cone body, head (front and back)

Step 3: Glue cone. Wrap the cone body piece into a cone shape. Apply glue to the glue tab and on the inside of one edge. Press glue tab and edge together to form the cone. Pinch the top of the cone together and glue. Apply glue inside the top with a toothpick or small paintbrush.

Step 4: Assemble. Glue the puppet's head to the top of the cone. First glue the front (face) of the head to the front of the cone, then glue the back of the head to the cone back. Carefully align the two head pieces. If any white shows around the head, either trim it away or color it to match the head.

Step 5: Final touches. To use the puppet, place the cone on a finger. If needed, loosely stuff the cone body with cotton, fiberfill or other stuffing material so it fits your finger snugly.

Goldilocks and the Three Bears is an adaptation of the original fairy tale. Use your puppets to re-tell the story or put on your playwrighting hat to write your own version.
